

And so I follow. Creeping on, like a creeping creeper. Smartphone in hand. What a voguer. But needs must right?



`An estimated 80 million European households own at least one pet animal, at least 24 percent own one dog and at least 25% own one cat.' Interestingly pet food consumptions are not taken into account when calculating a countries ecological footprint.

Gregory S. Okin conducted a study on the effects of American pet food consumption. Astonishingly, 'dogs and cats consume as much dietary energy as ~62 million Americans, which is approximately one-fifth of the US population. Although there are fewer dogs and cats in the US than people, they derive more of their energy from animal-derived products'.2 Another surprising prediction is that `If just one-quarter of the estimated 33% animal-derived energy in pet food was consumable by humans, it alone would support the animal-derived energy consumption of 26 million Americans (with 19% of their energy is derived from animal products)'.3

Otkin disputes the argument that pet food makes use of by-products from the meat industry by stating that this material could and in some cases is consumed by humans. Otkins proposes changing pet food, by basing it on waste such as bone material that humans strictly cannot consume. In this context, he also suggests the current bi-products used for pet food could be moved along the line for human



`Hi-YAH. ´ Announced the figure.


`Hi. ' Responded Bisou.

RADIO ANNOUNCEMENT


During a storm at the North Sea a floating dairy farm was cut off from the shore of Rotterdam. The floating dairy farm in the Netherlands⁸ had been implemented in response to the expanding demand for agricultural land. It was amongst other projects that attempted to save space. Such as tower blocks in which pigs are reared for meat.

Such isolation projects have been developed on one hand to contain the growing levels of greenhouse gases from the livestock industry as well as several other issues such as drought and loss of biodiversity. It is reported that 80% of deforestation is dedicated to agricultural land. With 83% of agricultural land used for cattle ranches. The floating dairy island had been inspired by Nelamon's CEO Steve van Tumanek's experience of Hurricane Sandy in America. In the devastation of

the hurricanes flooding people were cut off from food deliveries. Tumanek developed the floating dairy farm with the drive to grow food in close proximity to customers, in this case along the port of Rotterdam.¹¹

We'll be following up on the current headlines with further developments.


Out at sea the colleagues and the cows would soon become accustomed to the surrounding horizon and swaying floor.





In time they grew old and some passed. They would need to decide whether to establish more contact with those at land. The question of how was not easy. Deals would have to be made, how future exchange and co-operation between the island and the land, would all have to be negotiated. They prepared themselves as best they could for those processes.

Looking at my peculiar shaped toes as they perch on the table. From the corner of my eye peers the lvy as it grows over the pipes by the low roof. Across the table sits a

cookbook. The shiny oiled legs of the chicken are crossed over and tied together with string, it's breasts and anus exposed. There is no face though. The chicken's face is not the important part of this image. I flick through the next

pages. Anonymous legs lay on shiny plates; occasionally the odd live animal looks curiously into the camera. I stop at a recipe, 'Gallo Repieno '. Another body of a bird,

this time capon. A neutered male bird, one that is often fattened through force-feeding. Again no head to be seen, this time hairless legs spread apart, with a green,

grainy looking form jammed into the bird's anus. The body lays in a small pond of watery oil, with floating vegetables.

I looked down to my lap, there sits Morris, the pebble, covered in his hairy blanket. I reach my hand out and glide it along his stripey back.

Flutters appear in my stomach, my lower back grows tense in the chair. How did it come to be that we are such friends? That you sit on my lap, that I sit in this garden?

The podcast I have playing from my phone continues in the background.

Yeah RIGHT. We don't have to look far before we see that it's not just female non-human animals, but also males that undergo the same objectification and sexualization that women do in mainstream western culture. Mary Wheale points out the similarities between pony shows and beauty pageants; Wheale among others from movements such as eco-feminism and vegan intersectionalism argue that the way animals are imprisoned and abused in laboratories, homes, barns, and circuses is connected

This connection is extensive! Look at the unpaid, unrecognized reproductive workforce of women worldwide and the commodification of female reproductive material as alienated labor in the animal food industry.

to the way women are assaulted in

brothels, rape camps and homes.¹³


Mhm, mhm. This is also about `animalizing,' right? I watched a talk by Christian Sebastian Mcjetters and he was asserting that patriarchal, imperial, white supremacy creates an elitist and exclusive `human' identity by reserving certain rights and considerations to their constructed group. Which is predominantly white, cis, middle-class men and in some cases women. Mcjetters asserts that this `human' identity

excludes other marginalized groups namely those of African descent. Which - HOLD - THE -PHONE - did I just say that people of African descent are animals? No patriarchal, imperial, white supremacy does. It also wants us to pander to their games of let's be less like 'animals' and more like `humans'.14 Which maybe sounds like 'Well, animals kill so stop bashing on the meat industry right? No it's about recognizing the structures that oppress and incarcerate persons and diverting those.

Flicking and pulling on my ear lobe as I watch my fingers circling the top of Morris's head.

Adverts of happy cows with batting eyelashes willingly offering cups of milk fixate in my mind and make my stomach curdle. Then comes the women with splashes of milk coating their bodies, revealing smooth naked legs or waists. Like Mcjetters said, how can we be in 2020 and there are adverts on TV in which a young black mother in a hoody is transformed by drinking milk into an ecstatic athlete with barely any clothes on, to then be cheered on by her proud mother and daughter?

Sure most adverts are overtly sexist and ignorant. But these waters run deep.



So we're talking about white patriarchy and then we've got this floating forest garden emerging from a dairy farm in exile. What kind of times are we living in?

Right. Right. Well what's interesting for me about the floating - forest - dairy, no I won't call it dairy anymore. The cows are no longer dairying. The thing about this floating forest garden island, is that first of all it's cut off from the mainland right. So they are floating out there doing their own thing, to a certain extent. If you check the tools they got sent, it can't be possible to do any serious digging. They don't even have any ground to work with. They must have developed their soil from scratch. Nor will they have had the chemicals for treating pests, neither the chemicals for fertilizing. So we're looking at a no-tillage, organic form of food production. Whether they decided to use the feces from the cow's manure for fertilizer is not clear. I'm sure it took some time to come to some sort of consensus on that between them.

Why would that need such a consensus?

Well, in mainstream agriculture cow's manure along with other parts of animal bodies are often used to fertilize crops, if you consider that those materials come from the meat industry. Then you can maybe see why it's a sensitive topic.

Oh right, right.

So is that the part that connects the floating forest garden to patriarchal, imperial, white supremacy...?

Well, if you consider the historical accounts of colonialism appropriating other bodies. However many cultures work with cow manure in agriculture. To say that it's a white patriarchal thing to use cow manure would be to paint it too simple.

Why I think this is fascinating concerning white patriarchy, wow saying this word so many times does something funny with my head. But I'll go on to name it anyway. On this floating forest garden island, they work with a way of producing as well as exchanging food and seeds outside of the capitalist market. It's not a strikingly complicated and not a new idea. Yet in slowing down, they refined a relationship to the plants and the cows.

Working without chemicals, it's interesting to wonder how they managed to survive or grow so well. They must have a crazy ecosystem going on over there.

This all sounds very utopian...

I know I'm getting carried away, as usual. But hear me out. They are working with the ecosyste-

Sorry to interrupt but technically agro-industrial agriculture also works with ecosystems...high technology and a capital market happens to be a part of that one.

Right, but look where those symbioses have got us! There were some useful developments, I'm not proposing to go back to some idea of pure nature. Parts of both practices make sense.

Ok but when you say working with the ecosystem. What do you mean? That they are holding hands and singing in a circle?

Haha, wow I am ruffling your feathers. No, I'm talking about regenerative ecology, regenerative cultures. 15 And this is where it links to patriarchal, imperial, white supremacy, and the oppressive effects that come from that. Those effects are to name but a few; loss of biodiversity and environmental depletion, caused by industrialism and extractivism again to name just a few.

Oh ok and so here comes the floating forest island to save the day.

Ha, well I don't know about you, but I won't be waiting for any floating forest island to come and save us from this.

Haha, nope.

I'm just saying that there are some interesting qualities to look at there concerning this mess we are in. But we don't have time in this podcast to cover all the other islands we can learn from.

Ok, ok wrap it up will you, what's your point?

In forest gardens (because by the way, it's not the only one) there is carbon sequestration, healthy regulation of water, regeneration for the soil life, and of course lots of wicked vibrant habitats for critters. This is relevant in consideration of wildlife refugees, capitalist environmental ruins, climate crisis.

Ok let's take some time to digest that. I want to hear about these other island practices next time!

Yeah, let's get someone else in to talk about those.


Curious about these forest garden practices from the podcast. I looked into some of the methods and principles. In forest gardening, zones are used to describe how intensive and frequently you use or visit an area. The zones with the lower numbers are more intensive, those with higher less. There is also a zone five, which is where you do nothing. I wondered, did I or the cats have a zone five?

Although the cats did not visit the supermarkets themselves, it could be thought of as one of their zones. A rather intensive one, it could be a second or even a first zone. But the intensive land use based on the supermarket cat food is not situated at the supermarket. The animals for the meat are of course not raised in the supermarket and the food to feed those animals is also not produced in the supermarket, neither are the critters who's habitats are destroyed to make space for that production.

So technically there would also be some other pieces of land that would be the cat's intensive zones. Technically there would also be some other pieces of land that would also be my intensive zones. My eyes wander over my sketchbook. Morris still being a fantastic hairy pebble. Foxy lays on the table next to us. `Oh Foxy...´ I said. `Morris, aye...´ I sighed. Morris nuzzled into my knee cove a little deeper. I tip my head to watch and warmth fills my cheeks.

Then there is a screetch and a konk. And a dragonfly suddenly flails about on the table, Foxy tapping away at it with the side of her clawed paw.


